

MONITORING LOW LAKE LEVELS

Clear and Round Lakes are experiencing low water levels this year. By using real data from our Watershed Diagnostic Study, we see how and why our water level is temporarily low.

The dam at Round Lake controls outflowing water and serves as the reference point for lake level measurement. Typically, we see the highest lake levels in early spring to mid-summer and the lowest levels from mid-summer to winter. In 2025, the lake dropped over 14 inches from the highest level in April to its current level, shown in the graph.

The current low lake level is a result of two main factors: less rainfall and more evaporation. Steuben County has been in varying levels of drought conditions since September 2025 with little to no rain. Our inflowing ditches have brought less water, and warmer fall temperatures have increased evaporation rates of the lake's surface water.

The lake level should return to normal in early spring as snowmelt and seasonal rains bring in more water. Additional resources for low lake levels and drought monitoring are available on our website.


